

Post Office Directory Extract 1855 Ashton Keynes



Ashton Keynes, a township and parish in the Union of Cricklade and Wootton Bassett, Highworth Hundred, North Wilts, 4 miles west from Cricklade, 3 north of Minety station on the Cheltenham railway, and 88 from London. The living is a vicarage, with the chapelry of Leigh, in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, net income £324; the Rev. Charles Pitt, M.A., of Malmesbury, is the patron. The church is an ancient edifice, and dedicated to the Holy Cross, and contains several vestiges of the Norman style of architecture; it has a nave, with north and south transepts, two chancels, and a low square tower, containing 5 bells; the Rev. Samuel Bentley is the present incumbent. Adjoining the churchyard are the remains of a monastery, surrounded by a moat, converted into a farm-house. The village is pleasantly situated; the river Isis, or Thames, runs through it on one side of the road or street, and the bridges over it, leading to the houses, give it altogether a picturesque appearance. Here are the remains of four ancient stone crosses in different parts of the village, a Free school for boys and girls, and a charity, called Hawkin's and Chapman's charity, invested in land, now producing £55, £30 per annum o which is given to the second poor, and £15 for apprenticing a boy. Here are places of worship for two Dissenting congregations. The population, in 1851, was 1,056 in Ashton Keynes, besides 309 in Leigh chapelry, and the number of acres was 3,820.

North End and Wire Pool are 1 mile north; Broadway Corner, 1½ miles north; Rixon, 1 mile east; Leigh, 1 mile south-east; Cove Wood, 2 miles north; Buttislake, 2 miles south-by-east; Pound House, 1½ miles south-east. Back Street House is the residence of Robert Brown Esq.

Post Office - William Burnall, receiver. Letters arrive from Cirencester at 10 a.m. & are dispatched at 4 p.m. The nearest money order office is at Cricklade.
