Edward Robert enlisted with Devonshire Regiment in the early part of the war and was posted abroad in 1915, arriving in Egypt on 16th October. He was then transferred to 8th Battalion, Devonshires, stationed in France in time to take part of the Battle of the Somme.

Census 1911: Plough boy on farm

Although he was listed as "Missing" on the Casualty List issued by the War Office on 7th September 1919, his death was assumed to have occurred in July during the Battle of Bazentin Ridge. "His death was 'regarded' as being on 20th July 1916 during a night time assault on Bazentin Ridge, but again nobody really knows. He has no known grave.

By a cruel twist of fate, his brother (Army No. 19283) Pte Frederick Thomas (Tom) Hawkins died just eight days later in Mesopotamia while serving with the 5th Wiltshire Regiment. To lose one son is tragic, but to lose two within a week of each other is unimaginable".

Aldbourne WW1 website	The Dependant Pension Card names his mother, Emma Hawkins, resident in Bishopstone, as next of kin. It states that she was entitled to receive a dependants' separation allowance for Tom which precluded her receiving a further pension for Edward Robert.
