

Kellys Directory Extract 1867 BLUNSDON ST. LEONARD



Blunsdon St. Leonard (or Broad Blunsdon) is a village and ecclesiastical parish, in the Northern Division of the county, hundred and union of Highworth, county court district of Swindon, Cricklade parliamentary borough, diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, archdeaconry of Bristol, and rural deanery of Cricklade, distant county court district of Swindon, Cricklade parliamentary borough, diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, archdeaconry of Bristol, and rural deanery of Cricklade, distant county court district of Swindon, Cricklade, distant 3¹/₂ miles west from Highworth, 5 north from Swindon, and 81 from London. miles west from Highworth, 5 north from Swindon, and 80 from London. The church of St. Leonard is a neat building, with square tower containing 4 bells. The register dates from 1679. The living, formerly a chapelry of Highworth, has recently been endowed by the Ecclesiastical Commissioner, with £300 yearly, and constituted an independent rectory, in the gift of the Bishop of the diocese, and held by the Rev. Samuel F. Auchmuty, M.A., of Brasenose college, Oxford. There is a school for boys and girls, built upon church land, supported partly by clergyman of the parish and partly by the weekly payments of the children. At Bury Town, in this parish, there is a camp; and some amour, in the possession of Mr. Benger, a farmer there, was dug from a barrow near the camp. The manorial rights are divided, and there are a number of landowners with separate holdings. The soils is chiefly clay and stone brash. The chief crops are grass, wheat, barley, beans and roots. The population in 1861 was 806; the area is 2,242 acres.

Oldcroft is a quarter of mile south; Cold Harbour, half a mile south; Groundwell, 1 mile south; Hyde, 2 miles southeast; Bury Town one mile north-east.
