# **Thomas Nutley**

Thomas Nutley was baptised at Collingbourne Kingston, 5 August 1804, son of William Nutley.

## His Crime at Collingbourne Kingston:

Committed to Fisherton Gaol Thomas Nutley, charged with stealing gold watch and several gold and other rings, the property of Thomas and Anne Gilbert, at Collingbourne Kingston. Salisbury and Winchester Journal, Monday, 8 January 1827

...On Saturday the following were removed on board the Captivity hulk, Devonport: ...Thomas Nutley..... Salisbury and Winchester Journal, Monday, 28 May 1827

# **Convict Records in Australia**

Thomas Nutley, Convict No 174, Sentenced to Life at Wilts Assizes, 16th March 1827. Transported, for housebreaking, on the ship "York", departing 30th April 1829, arriving in Van Diemen's Land, 28th August 1829, with 191 other convicts

## **Tasmanian Convict Record - Appropriation Record**

Convict no: 174, Thomas Nutley, 25, former occupation: footman/on door/9 years, Wilts, sentence: life, Collingbourn, Mr. A. Morrison.

#### Hobart Town Police Report:

Bothwell – Thomas Nutley was sentenced six weeks in chains, charged by his master, Mr. Babtie, with impeaching his character. Trumpeter General (Hobart, Tasmania), Friday, 24 October 1834, Page 3

15 May 1844 - The Lieutenant-Governor has been pleased to grant Tickets of Leave to the undermentioned Convicts: ... Thomas Nutley, York[convict ship] ... Colonial Times, (Hobart, Tasmania), Tuesday, 21 May 1844, Page 4

Convict Department - It is hereby notified to the under-mentioned individuals, that it is the Lieutenant-Governor's intention to recommend them to the gracious consideration of Her Majesty the queen for conditional Pardons, available within the limits of the Australian colonies and New Zealand. ...... Thomas Nutley..... Colonial Times (Hobart, Tasmania), Friday, 29 May 1846, Page 2.

Tuesday October 5, 1847, Convict Department - It is hereby notified, that his Excellency has received instructions from the Right Honorable the secretary of State, conveying he majesty's approval of the Pardons held by the under-mentioned persons being extended, the only condition being that the holders thereof shall not return to or be found within the United Kingdom and Ireland.

#### Convict Department - 24th January 1853.

In accordance with the Act of Council 6th Victoria No 18, I hereby give notice, for the first time, that his Excellency the Lieut.-Governor has been pleased to approve of the solemnization of Matrimony between the under-mentioned parties: ... Thomas Nutley, free, and Ann Osborne, residing at New Norfolk. ... Hobart Guardian, or, True Friend of Tasmania (Hobart, Tasmania), Saturday, 29 January 1853, Page 2.

On the 2 May 1854, Thomas Nutley was a steerage passenger on the ship The Black Swan, which left Launceston, bound for Melbourne.

Melbourne newspapers of the period mention a Thomas Nutley in 3 articles - Is this the same Thomas Nutley?

#### **New Insolvents**

Thomas Nutley, Fryer's Town, commercial traveller. Causes of insolvency: Losses in quartz-mining, want of employment, and non-payment of salary. Debts, £245 7s.; assets, £20; deficiency, £225 7s. Official assignee, Mr. Shaw. The Age (Melbourne, Victoria), Tuesday, 1 May 1860, Page 6.

#### The Death of Thomas Nutley, September 1887, aged 83:

The Immigrant's Homes

The weekly committee of the management of the Immigrants' Aid Society was held on Friday in the hospital division of the institution, St. Kilda's Road. Present - Messrs. A. Wooley, H. Moore, J. Louda, W. Levers, snr., and G. T. Thompson, who occupied the chair. The superintendent reported the state of the house to be as follows, viz: - Number remaining last week, 670; admitted since, 39; discharged 33; died, 3 ... and Thomas Nutley, 83, native of Wiltshire, England; ....
