

William Christopher White Gunner 61562, Royal Garrison Artillery

William Christopher White (Chris) was born in North Bradley 1892, his birth being registered in the March Quarter of that year in the Westbury Registration District. He was the son of James and Eliza White (Nee Eyres) of North Bradley. It is probable that Christopher was baptised in North Bradley Baptist Church since he was a regular worshipper at the church before joining the army.

According to the 1901 Census the family were living in North Bradley and comprised:-

James White, Head, 44, Loom Fixer in Cloth Mill, born in Hilperton; Eliza, Wife, 44, born in North Bradley; Ada F., Daughter, 23, Shader in Cloth Mill, born in Trowbridge; Gertrude D., Daughter, 20, Dress Maker, born in North Bradley; Wilfred G., Son, 16, Bakers Assistant, Born in North Bradley; May E., Daughter, 14, Drapers Apprentice, born in North Bradley; Howard J., Son, 11, born in North Bradley, Christopher W., Son, 9, Born in North Bradley; Winifred B., Daughter, 3, born in North Bradley.

The 1911 Census records the family at, Yarnbrook Road, North Bradley as follows:-

James White, Head, 54, Loom Tuner, born in Hilperton; Eliza, Wife, 54, born in Bradley; Howard, Son, 21, Journeyman Tailor, born Bradley; Christopher, Son, 19, Grocer's Assistant, born in Bradley; Winifred, 13, Daughter, Scholar, born in Bradley; Lily Cardy, Daughter, 36, born in Hilperton; Wilfred Cardy, Grandson, 9, born in Bradley; Christopher Cardy, Infant Grandson, Born in Bradley.

Chris's parents married in 1874 and there were nine children born to the couple.

William enlisted at Trowbridge on the 25th October 1915 after receiving his call up notice and was assigned to the Royal Garrison Artillery. At the time of enlistment, he was working as a Clerk.

Below is a copy of the signature appearing in William's attestation papers.

On the 10th November 1915 William Christopher joined his united in Portsmouth. On 27th April 1916 he was posted to H169 Royal Garrison Artillery. On the 3rd September 1916 he was further deployed to 108 battery

Royal Garrison Artillery in preparation for deployment to France. On the front-line theses batteries were responsible for heavy shelling of enemy targets and naturally were a target of bombardment themselves.

On 3rd February 1917 William was deprived 3 days pay for breaking off parade without permission at 10 a.m.

William Christopher White was transferred to a field hospital on the 18th April 1917 but died of wounds on the




William Christopher White is commemorated on the North Bradley Memorials and is named in the North Bradley Section of Diocese of Salisbury Memorial Book held in Salisbury Cathedral.

A letter to Eliza White (mother) at Mount Pleasant, North Bradley was sent from Dover Station on 20th November 1917 accompanying William Christopher's personal affects. These included a disc, letters, photos, tobacco pouch, 2


purses, pencil, watch and guard, cigarette case, 2 religious books, cards, gunnery instruction (written), and coin.

A letter requesting information to enable the presentation of the "death plaque and memorial scroll" was sent to Eliza White at the same address on the 11th April 1919.

On the 15th April 1919 James White father signed a declaration of all of William Christopher's living relatives in certain categories. This included names, age, address and relationship. The table below shows the information recorded in the declaration.
