SEEND SOCIAL CLUB AND COMMUNITY CENTRE In conversation with Peter Fisher 12th June 2006

Brief History

The Social Club dates back to 1922 when Col. Bell, concerned about the lack of facilities for ex servicemen, donated "a corner of my field" and acquired three huts, one of which became the Social Club. In the following years the Club flourished and its members enjoyed games such as skittles, dominoes and darts. Eventually a license to serve alcohol was obtained and the bar became the main source of income which progressively funded the structure that we see today. However, in recent years, skittles which was one of the main attractions has declined as a social activity and the loss of income caused deterioration in the Club's financial results.

As a consequence of new legislation, many areas of the Club require improvement and upgrading. Toilets, the kitchen, the position of the oil tank and inadequate heating are some examples. The need for maintenance, new furnishings and decoration is obvious and detract from the appeal of the hall for letting and village functions. The Social Club did not have the cash for these urgently needed improvements and without which closure was inevitable. Some three years ago application was made to the Charity's Commission for the existing premises to become the Seend Community Centre and Social Club based upon a 99 year lease. Last August the application proved successful. The licensed area of the Social Club is now the trading arm of the Community Centre. A formal request has been made to the Financial Services Authority, which has absorbed the Friendly Societies, to cancel the registration of the social club.

Current Situation

It is extremely difficult to imagine any form of community without a focal point and the loss of the Community Centre and Social Club would create this condition. The Community Centre can hopefully provide facilities for all types of village needs, dinners, dances, meetings, shows, wakes etc and with funds, the hall and patio areas can be ideal for these purposes. What is now needed is a Chairman and Committee members who will stimulate new ideas and activities with wide appeal to the parish and neighbouring communities. This amenity is here for the good of the village and we need to get people through the door who will use it constructively. Efforts are

being made to raise money from the Lottery Fund and other sources to provide the improvements that are listed but above all we want enthusiastic volunteers to help make it a success.

As a community we should become members to support this facility and if you wish to use the bar and take advantage of Club prices, membership is only £8 per annum (less for Senior Citizens). The bar is there for your use and open every evening. Contacts: Graham Hickman (Secretary) 828868 or BJ Tilley either directly at the Social Club or Tel No: 828796.

For special events there is a large screen projection facility and already a thriving table tennis group. The more members we can acquire the better, so come on MAKE A REAL EFFORT TO KEEP AND DEVELOP THIS ASSET within our community.

From Where I Stand...

...the early part of this summer has been extremely busy but also a privilege with a significant number of both weddings and funerals. You may think it rather strange to think of such different events in the same sentence but from where I stand...

Both occasions are times of change for all involved, time for celebration of life, time to look back over the past, as well as time for reflection on what the future may hold. Before being ordained I never really enjoyed weddings but now find it an honour to spend time with the soon-to be-married couple and support them through a life changing experience. I remind them that while we take time to prepare for the wedding it is a lifetime's work to sort out the marriage!

Similarly I too have experienced the transforming nature of bereavement when my mother died several years ago, her funeral being the first that I led, and now find that it is not only my clergy training and experience but my own personal encounter with loss that helps me 'be alongside' those who are arranging the funeral of a loved one. From where I stand then both kinds of life experience has something to say to us all. It is a crossroads, a point of change, a new direction, the change from one kind of living to the next. In commitment for life to someone you love there is both hope and trust, the building of a relationship that is two-way, that can understand love to mean wanting the other person to grow to be all that he/she can become, not to change him or her, but to celebrate the person you love as a whole being. In dealing with the loss of one we love through death also involves hope and trust, the willingness to let go, to let God make him or her complete in life forever with Him, for them to know only love that celebrates all that he or she had been in this earthly life but also to live in God's love forever. It is to celebrate the whole of their being that we have known in life, both the good times and the bad, and to let them go certain that we are, with God, united with those we truly love forever.

Both these great life 'crossroads' are times of change along the journey of our lives.

As we ease through summer and onto autumn so our lives follow that same pattern, that sense of journey, the change of scenery, events, encounters, experiences. It takes courage, patience and time, to be able to see rather less

dramatic but no less valuable occasions when we may notice even small changes in our own lives and learn from them.

Perhaps many of us could find time to pause like this for a 'stand and stare' moment, to allow one experience to lead us to other reflections and realisations. In that place of pausing and reflecting we can journey a long way and may begin to sense the presence of God and so be led to see Him more clearly and find ways of knowing Him more deeply.

Club Trip to Brittany

On the 14th June, a coach load of members set off for Brittany; for the first time we used Calne Coaches and found we had a very comfortable vehicle, with ample leg room and a very efficient air conditioning system. Our driver, Andy, proved to be good and we knew that we had an efficient organiser in Jim Fish, of Newbourne Travel.

On the way down to Portsmouth, to catch the ferry to St Malo, we stopped at Fursey Gardens at Minstead in the New Forest. This is sited in a very sheltered spot, so that we saw unusual shrubs flourished and was reminiscent of the variety of plants that we saw on the Club's visit to Southern Ireland a

few years ago. This delightfully informal garden was set up in 1922 and is run by a charitable trust offering training and residential care to young people with learning difficulties. A very peaceful place.

After a night's rest and a continental breakfast on board Brittany Ferries, we set off for the Gardens of Broceliande, which has several of France's National Collections of plants, including Iris and Roses. The various gardens are used to illustrate myth and legend and have an element of surprise as we moved from colourful flower beds, through sunken ways and water features. Our French guide did her best to explain everything to us, with a little help from us. The gardens are used to help older people with disabilities and during the year have festivals and special weeks for artists.

We stopped for a while in the delightful old town of Dinan, to look around and shop, before descending from its prominent position on the hill, to our hotel by the River Rance. The Hotel Jerzual proved to be comfortable and in a quiet spot by the river, but the narrow road and old bridge proved to be a test of Andy's driving skills!

The next day we were off to Chateau de Bienassis, which was in truth well situated having good views all around. It possessed fortified walls all around and an impressive gatehouse and moat. Its origins dated from the 15th century, but had been damaged and partially rebuilt over the centuries and altered as domestic arrangements improved. The present owner took us around the house, which an aunt had spent a lifetime restoring. Consequently there were many original pieces of furniture, panelling and objects of great interest. The whole edifice was built of the local rose coloured sandstone, which is very attractive. After visiting the formal gardens, we were offered a drink of cider, made from their own apples, and a dish made by the lady of the house, which were both delicious.

The house at Montmarin, is typical of those built by wealthy St Malo ship owners, as a summer residence in the 18th century, on the banks of the River Rance. The view across the widest part of the river is quite spectacular, with steps leading down to the water. The gardens are in both English and French styles. The whole estate is now classified as a National Monument. There were interesting plants for sale from the Nursery. On our return to the hotel, some took a boat trip downstream for an hour where the River Rance becomes a canal, built by Napoleon to provide an escape to Nantes, when the British were blockading the port of St Malo. We saw at the village of Lehon, a magnificent Cathedral, which had been built by Welsh monks—it is now used as a museum; quite unexpected, in what now seemed to be a remote spot. Next day, we visited the Chateau de La Ballue, 12 miles south of St Malo. There is a formal garden laid out at the back of the house, to take advantage of the view, but the rest of the gardens are formed into enclosed spaces, a

labyrinth and perspective alleys by walls of greenery formed from a variety of trees and shrubs. These secret gardens are unusual and form a temple to Diana, an open air theatre, a maze and a fernery and in each there is a piece of modern sculpture.

We travelled on to the port of St Malo to have lunch and to spend an afternoon exploring or shopping, as we wished. On the way back to Dinan, we stopped, as is tradition on these visits at a supermarche, for a final stock up on French goodies.

On the following morning, we set off for the ferry with much regret and wishing that we could stay longer - surely a sign that everyone had enjoyed their time in Brittany. Apart from a few of our strong men having to bump a car out of the coach's way, at the entrance to the ferry park, we arrived back in Seend without incident. Our grateful thanks to Jean and Roger Allen, both for their hospitality before the trip and for their part in organising it, and also to Jim and Andy for their professional help. We hope that Margaret will soon be fully recovered and were sorry that she had to cry off at the last minute. Perhaps next year.

SEEND PARISH COUNCIL

The June meeting was attended by 7 Councillors, with Mrs Savage in the Chair.

There have been enquiries to rent the allotments opposite The Bell. These are presently very overgrown, and the PC will investigate the costs of clearing them, and reinstating the opening, in order that they can be used.

Several parishioners were in attendance at the meeting, and wished to discuss the siting of a mobile home and works being undertaken in Spiders Paddock, Bradley Lane. Mrs Carr told the PC that Kennet DC is aware of the problem, and she outlined the action that would be taken. A temporary stop notice would be issued on 28th June, and will cease to have effect on 24th July, by which time the Council will have served a full stop notice to prevent further works, and enforcement notices for the removal of the mobile home, hardstanding and all items not required for the authorized use of the land for agriculture. The owner of the paddock will have a right of appeal. The stile on the footpath had been reinstated, and the "private property" notice taken down. The PC will investigate the historic rights in Bradley Lane for vehicular access.

It has been noted that the sign for Sells Green, coming from Devizes, is actually in Martinslade. The PC will contact Kennet DC about this.

The PC are again concerned at the traffic chaos when car boot sales are taking place near Redstocks crossroads, and the organizers will be requested to resume use of the parking signs, as these did make a difference towards the end of the last season.

ALEXANDER TECHNIQUE

'Alexander Technique' in a word is about poise, which in turn may improve how you move, perform, look and feel. The technique teaches people how to release unnecessary muscular tension and how to improve posture and the better realignment of the body.

A guiding principle of the Technique is that use affects functioning ... our everyday activity. For example the way we align our body affects our breathing, and so in turn our general well-being. A good posture relieves pressure on the internal organs and their better functioning improves the body's health. If we accept that good health is our bottom line and that health improves our spirits, our sense of purpose, our composure etc then such a Technique is worthwhile

"Why are you here?" asks the teacher; the chances are that you are presenting with shoulder, back or neck problems. Making yourself aware of a habitual posture which adversely affects you and causes tension and discomfort is a key part of the teaching. For everything you think or do is translated into tension so long as habitual body posture interferes with daily activities. The awareness of what you are doing, the alignment of the body, the unrestricted breathing the release of muscular tension combine to give a remarkably improved sense of well-being both physically and mentally.

The founder of the Technique, Frederick M Alexander, developed it to assist the projection of his voice in his career as an actor. The Technique is taught as a matter of course in theatre, dance and music. Schools .STAT (the Society of Teachers of the Alexander technique (1958)) was founded in the UK to ensure standards of teacher training and practice, Workshops and one to one lessons are the usual means of promoting the Society's teachings
