Steeple Ashton 1800-1849

1827

Violent Assault and Robbery. Five men were apprehended at Trowbridge, under circumstances which justified a very strong suspicion of their having robbed and cruelly treated a man named Bailey of Keevil on Tuesday evening previous. Two of the men Richard Doggett and Moses Angell of Steeple Ashton were fully committed to Fisherton gaol for trial. Jackson's Oxford Journal, 29 November 1827

1828

Committed to the House of Correction, Devizes. James Willes of Seend, for three months, for disobeying an order of bastardy due to the parish of Steeple Ashton.

1834

Committed to the House of Correction, Devizes. James Wicks and William Wilkins, for four months each for stealing a quantity of potatoes the property of George Ball, of Steeple Ashton. **Winchester Chronicle, 9 August 1834**

1840

Daring Highway Robbery. On Saturday morning about 2 o'clock as Rose the carrier of Steeple Ashton was going from Bath to Bristol with a load, on arrival at Newbridge Hill, three fellows robbed his cart of a cask, (supposed to contain spices) with which they made off with in sight of him. The cask was directed to Mr. Ruddle, Melksham.

1841

Committed to the New Prison Devizes. Henry Oram, for fourteen days, for a misdemeanor in the service of James Matravers, at Steeple Ashton. **Devizes and Wiltshire Gazette**, **11 February 1841**

For Trial. William Bennit, charged with having been an incorrigible rogue, this being his second offence, for leaving his family chargeable to the tithing of Steeple Ashton. Salisbury Guardian, 25 September 1841

1847

Committed to the New Prison, Devizes. chargeable to the parish of Steeple Ashton.

William Benett, for two months, for leaving his family
