A Register of Moneys collected upon Briefs Grace the Act of Parliament made for that purpose Anno 4° & 5° Anna. Regina

OPC Note:

Briefs were a way for people to raise money for the rebuilding or repair of their church, or for damage after a natural disaster.

They originated in the 13th century, but the most prolific period for collections was the seventeen and eighteenth centuries, when mentions are found in parish registers or separate brief books.

In order to obtain a brief, you had to apply to the reigning monarch, who, if successful, would grant Letters Patent for the appeal to be made. The brief would then be read out in churches, and a collection made after the service. The money would be given to an authorised travelling collector or handed over during the Bishop's visitation.
