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Cyril Henry Robert ROSENTHAL

Cyril Henry Robert Rosenthal was born on 24th August, 1898 at Kapunda (according to details on Attestation Paers), South Australia to parents John George Henry & Louisa Charlotte Rosenthal (nee Wahlert). His birth was registered in Burra, South Australia. Cyril stated he was a 19 year old, single, Butcher from Freeling, South Australia when he enlisted at Adelaide, South Australia on 6th May, 1916 with the 8th Infantry Brigade, 32nd Infantry Battalion, 8th Reinforcements of the Australian Army (A.I.F.). His service number was 3618 & his religion was Church of England. His next of kin was listed as his father – George Henry Rosenthal of Hansborough, South Australia. Cyril had served 3 years with Senior Cadets. 80th Battalion Infantry (left due to leaving district). As Cyril was under the age of 21, his father had written a letter dated 29th March, 1916 which reads: "Dear Cyril, I am pleased to hear that you have decided to enlist and give my consent to join Army. I shall be very pleased to see you, if you can spare a day or two, before going to Adelaide. I remain your loving father *G. H. Rosenthal.*"

Private Cyril Henry Robert Rosenthal embarked from Adelaide on HMAT *Ballarat (A70)* on 12th August, 1916 & disembarked at Plymouth, England on 30th September, 1916. Pte Rosenthal had been admitted to Ship's Hospital on 20th September, 1918 to 30th September, 1918 when it docked.

Pte Rosenthal was admitted sick to Military Hospital at Devonport on 30th September, 1916 with pneumonia. He was discharged on 5th October, 1916.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Pte Rosenthal was marched in to No. 1 Command Depot at Perham Downs & medically classified as B1 A on 7th October, 1916.

Pte Rosenthal was marched out on 13th October, 1916 from No. 1 Command Depot to No. 4 Command Depot at Wareham. Pte Rosenthal was marched out to No. 3 Command Depot at Hurdcott, Wiltshire on 14th March, 1917. He was medically classified as B1 A4 at Hurdcott on 18th April, 1917 & reclassified as A4 (Fit for Active Service when of age (military) on 3rd June, 1917. Pte Rosenthal was classified as A4 at Hurdcott on 24th September, 1917.

Pte Rosenthal was marched out to Overseas Training Brigade at Longbridge Deverill, Wiltshire on 28th February, 1918

Private Cyril Henry Robert Rosenthal proceeded Overseas to France from Longbridge Deverill via Southampton on 28th March, 1918. He was marched in from England at A.I.B.D. (Australian Infantry Base Depot) at Havre on 29th March, 1918 & marched out to his Unit on 6th April, 1918.

Pte Rosenthal was taken on strength with 32nd Battalion in the field on 10th April, 1918.

Pte Rosenthal was wounded in action on 24th April, 1918. He was admitted to 11th Australian Field Ambulance & transferred to 4th Casualty Clearing Station with a gunshot wound to Hip & finger. Pte Rosenthal was transferred to 6th General Hospital at Rouen, France on 25th April, 1918. Pte Rosenthal embarked for England on Hospital Ship *St. David* on 28th April, 1918.

Pte Rosenthal was admitted to 5th Southern General Hospital at Portsmouth on 29th April, 1918 with a gunshot wound to left thigh, severe. Pte Rosenthal was transferred to 1st Auxiliary Hospital at Harefield on 3rd May, 1917.

Pte Rosenthal was on furlo from 25th May, 1918 to 8th June, 1918 & was to report to No. 1 Command Depot at Sutton Veny.

Pte Rosenthal was marched in to No. 1 Command Depot at Sutton Veny on 10th June, 1918.

Pte Rosenthal was admitted to 1st Australian Dermatological Hospital at Bulford, Wiltshire on 11th June, 1918 originally cause not determined but later found to be VD. He was discharged to C.T.D. at Parkhouse on 13th June, 1918. Pte Rosenthal discharged from Parkhouse on 6th August, 1918.

Pte Rosenthal was marched in to No. 1 Command Depot at Sutton Veny on 6th August, 1918 & medically classed as A3 (Fit for Overseas Training Camp – to which transferred for hardening, prior to rejoining unit overseas).

Pte Rosenthal was marched out to Overseas Training Brigade at Longbridge Deverill, Wiltshire on 9th August, 1918.

Private Cyril Henry Robert Rosenthal was sent sick Sutton Veny Hospital & then admitted to the Military Hospital at Sutton Veny, Wiltshire on 18th August, 1918 seriously ill with Acute Peritonitis.

Private Cyril Henry Robert Rosenthal died at 5.15 am on 4th September, 1918 at the Military Hospital, Sutton Veny of Tuberculosis generalised & Peritonitis generalised.

A death for Cyril H. R. Rosenthal, aged 19, was registered in the September quarter, 1918 in the district of Warminster, Wiltshire.

Private Cyril Henry Robert Rosenthal was buried on 9th September, 1918 in St. John the Evangelist Churchyard at Sutton Veny - Grave no. 362. From the burial report of Pte Rosenthal - *Coffin was good polished Elm with Brass Mounts – Deceased was buried with full Military Honours, the body being conveyed to the graveside on a Gun Carriage preceded by a Firing Party and band. Six of deceased's comrades acted as Pallbearers. Mrs & Miss M. Tallis of 122 Benacre Street, Birmingham, (friends of deceased) were chief mourners. The Officers, N.C.O.'s and about 100 Men of deceased's late company also attended as mourners. A floral wreath from Mrs & Miss Tallis was placed on the grave after the "Last Post" had been sounded. Headquarters A.I.F. Depots in U. K. were represented at the funeral.*

Pte Cyril Henry Robert Rosenthal requested in his Will dated 13th July, 1917 that all his real & personal Estate be left to his brother – Mr G. H. Rosenthal of Kapunda, South Australia.

Private C. H. R. Rosenthal is commemorated in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 121.



Pte Cyril Henry Robert Rosenthal was entitled to British War Medal & the Victory Medal. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Pte Rosenthal's father – Mr G. H. Rosenthal (Scroll sent July, 1921 & Plaque sent November, 1922).

The CWGC lists Private Cyril Henry Robert Rosenthal, 3618, of 32nd Battalion, Australian Infantry, A.I.F., as the son of John George Henry and Louisa Rosenthal of Ellen St., Semaphore, South Australia. Born at Kapunda.

Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone at St. John the Evangelist Churchyard at Sutton Veny. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government. *(Information obtained from letters sent to next of kin in 1921)*

Pte Cyril Henry Robert Rosenthal does have a personal inscription on his headstone.


