John BRYANS

John Bryans was born in Toowoomba, Queensland in 1893 to parents William & Margaret Bryans (nee Young). He was a 22 year old, single, School Teacher from Caxton Street, Petrie Terrace, Brisbane, Queensland when he enlisted at Brisbane, Queensland on 31st December, 1915 with the 9th Field Artillery Brigade, 35th Battery of the Australian Army (A.I.F.). His service number was 21126 & his religion was Methodist. His next of kin was listed as his father – Mr W. Bryans of Caxton Street, Petrie Terrace, Brisbane, Queensland.

Gunner John Bryans embarked from Sydney on HMAT *Argyllshire (A8)* on 11th May, 1916 & disembarked at Devonport, England on 10th July, 1916. Gunner Bryans had been admitted to the Ship's Hospital twice while at sea – 29th May to 31st May, 1916 & again 29th June to 1st July, 1916. Both times he was in the Ship's Hospital for 3 days suffering from Influenza.

Gunner John Bryans was passed out as a Driver on 25th August, 1916.

Driver Bryans was written up for an offence – Absent without leave from "No. 2 Camp Boyton from midnight 26th August, 1916 to tattoo on 27th August, 1916 22 hours" He was forfeited a total of 3 days' pay.

Driver Bryans proceeded overseas to France from Southampton on 31st December, 1916. He was transferred from 23rd Field Artillery Brigade and taken on strength with 3rd A.D.A.D. on 6th January, 1917.

Driver Bryans was transferred to 12th Army F.A.B. (Field Artillery Brigade) from 3rd Division Details from 4th February to 9th March, 1917 pending absorption in 11th F.A.B.

Driver Bryans was taken on strength with 11th F.A.B. and posted to 111th Bty. in France on 9th March, 1917.

Driver Bryans was remustered as Gunner at his own request on 30th June, 1917.

Gunner Bryans was on leave to UK from Belgium on 20th October, 1917 & rejoined from leave in France on 4th November, 1917.

Gunner Bryans was reported "FAB With Unit" on 10th June, 1918.

Gunner Bryans was on leave to UK from France on 22nd October, 1918. He was sent to Hospital sick whilst on furlo in UK on 1st November, 1918.

Gunner John Bryans was admitted to the Military Hospital at Sutton Veny, Wiltshire on 2nd November, 1918 with Influenza – seriously ill.

Gunner John Bryans died at 2.45 a.m. on 5th November, 1918 at the Military Hospital, Sutton Veny of Influenza & Pneumonia.

A death for Jack Bryans, aged 25, was registered in the December quarter, 1918 in the district of Warminster, Wiltshire.

Gunner John Bryans was buried on 8th November, 1918 at 3 p.m. in St. John the Evangelist Churchyard at Sutton Veny - Grave no. 18. From the burial report of Gunner John Bryans - *Coffin was polished elm with Brass Mounts* – *Deceased was buried with full Military Honours. The funeral was preceded by a Firing Party and Band from No. 1 Command Depot, Sutton Veny. Six of deceased's late Unit comrades acted as Pall bearers. 3 Officers and about 80 N.C.O.'s and men followed the remains and were present at the graveside ceremony. Headquarters A.I.F. Depots in United Kingdom were represented. Also attending the funeral were friends* – *Miss V. Evans (129 Mortimer Street, Trowbridge) & Mrs F. Pepler (Back Street, Trowbridge).*

Gunner John Bryans was entitled to British War Medal & the Victory Medal. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Gunner Bryans's father – Mr W. Bryans of Moggill Road, Taringa, Brisbane. (sent February, 1922 & October, 1922)

Gunner J. Bryans is commemorated in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 16.


Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone at St. John the Evangelist Churchyard at Sutton Veny. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.
