London to Brighton Veteran Car Rally 2013

3am Sunday 3rd November. Colin, Terry and John are already up and making a cuppa before setting off for London with a "Mobile Steam Car" (year 1900) safely loaded on the trailer. Steam-up is achieved by lighting a petrol-fuelled boiler to generate the required propulsion. We are to meet up with John Blackford, the owner of said steam car, in Hyde Park. The M4 is quiet at that time on a Sunday and we make good time.

The rally is for cars built prior to 1905. Considering the first were built in 1896, there is a huge array of manufacturers and designs still running the 86 miles or so today. It is the World's Longest Running Motoring Event, 2013 being the 117th anniversary run.

Terry Satchell rides shotgun for the first section from Hyde Park Serpentine to Croydon, usually a reliable run out past the houses of Parliament and down the A23. However, this morning proves to be a little problematical with the main pin holding the engine into place coming loose and fracturing a copper pipe. John Blackford is a very capable engineer and between the two of them, an effective repair is made.

In Croydon Kinghams, a small garage, opens up early Sunday morning to supply water to fill the on-board tank for our steamer. The proprietors also supply much needed bacon rolls and coffee to the participants. John Summers jumps into the passenger seat for the next leg to Crawley.

Each time, we dress up in warm clothing, as it is very cold on the car. Thankfully this year it remains dry all day.

The route is lined with spectators for mile upon mile. Over the M25 and onwards towards Redhill where, after a long uphill section, our steamer requires some more attention to keep the flame burning strongly to generate enough steam.







At Crawley we take some petrol to top up the burner tank so that we can make Brighton without running out. In total we will burn 20 litres of petrol and use 80 litres of water between London and Brighton.

Colin Pearson jumps up on the bench seat to accompany John for the final leg into Brighton. We travel via Cuckfield, where we take on some more water and then it's over the South Downs where the local 4x4 club turn out to tow some of the competitors up the long Hammer and Clayton hills.

Down the hill through Pyecombe and into Brighton for the final control in the park. Cars then travel through the town centre and onto the seafront at Madeira Drive where hundreds of people turn out to see the spectacle. Each competitor is interviewed and given a finisher's medal.

We decide to move on and meet up with Terry, John and Viv Blackford who have the trailer ready to load in a Car Park on the Seafront. Once the boiler is de-pressurised we strap the car safely in the trailer, grab an "All Day Breakfast" and return to Bremhill for a welcome scotch and retire after a very long but rewarding day.

GALETTE DES ROIS

This is a puff pastry pie, filled with frangipane, very popular in France and traditionally eaten on the Twelfth Day of Christmas. It was to celebrate Epiphany, the visit of the Three Kings. Usually a charm (une fève) is baked inside the cake, and whoever gets this, becomes King or Queen for the day and can choose their King or Queen. It goes well with a cup of tea and even better with a glass (or two) of white wine.

Ingredients

- 400g ready-made puff pastry
- 2 rounded tbsp apricot jam
- 100g softened butter
- 100g caster sugar
- 1 lightly beaten egg + 1 yolk
- 150g ground almonds
- 2 3 tbsp cognac (optional)





Method

- 1. Heat the oven to 200C/fanC180/gas 6.
- 2. Divide the ready-made puff pastry in half, roll out each piece and cut into a 25cm round. Put one round on a baking sheet and spread with the apricot jam to within 2cm of the edges.
- 3. Beat together the softened butter and caster sugar until light and fluffy, then beat in the egg. Stir in the ground almonds and cognac.
- 4. Spoon the mixture over the jam, spreading it evenly. Brush the edges of the pastry with water, then cover with the second piece, pressing the edges to seal. Mark the top of the pastry from the centre to the edges like the spokes of a wheel or in a zig zag pattern, then brush with beaten egg.
- 5. Bake for 25-30 mins until crisp and golden. Serve warm or cold.

This pie could also be filled with apple compote, if desired, with (optional) calvados added.






EVEREST MARATHON 2013: THE AFTERMATH

It is fair to say that, despite our research, this proved to be a challenge we both felt at times was beyond us. Outside the shelter of our hotel in Kathmandu we experienced a complete culture shock, both in the city and then in the mountains.

The streets of Kathmandu were choked in the thick smog of vehicle fumes, despite which, a teeming mass of humanity went about its business in a chaotic, yet calm, ambivalence.



Free of the city, and after touching down on the short steep mountain runway at Lukla, we began our trek. This is the start point for most expeditions into the Everest range and is a mix of lodges and stalls selling every type of provisioning, the narrow cobbled streets bustling with activity. The only form of transport from here is by foot, so we set off with porters, vaks and sirdars in the direction of Namche Bazaar.

The dust, yak dung, poor hygiene and very basic sanitation result in a constant battle to stay healthy during our two week acclimatisation trek up to Gorak Shep. Getting to the start line is a major challenge; most entrants, myself included, suffer from diarrhoea and vomiting (D&V) at some point. Acute Mountain Sickness (AMS) is also fairly common and Trin suffered with the condition which meant that we had to stay behind while the group ascended to the next camp. We were able to follow on the next day.

During the trek, two of our party are air lifted down and several are unable to continue up to the start at 5184m, due to the effects of AMS. Under canvass for most of the trek, with temperatures dropping to -15 C at night, sleep does not come easily. Catering is provided by our enthusiastic travelling kitchen team - food prepared al fresco amongst the dirt and debris of a trekking camp site.






As a result, when we finally line up for the start both Trin and I are mostly just relieved to be there and not too broken by the experience.

Thursday 28th November, 6.30am start, barely daylight, freezing cold, we shuffle across the icy tundra and up onto the rocky moraine, the field quickly spreading out with the twenty or so Nepali runners flying into the distance. We continue through bleak, yet stunning scenery, the rocky trail and thin air making progress slow and hesitant. With 6 miles completed we are back on more familiar trekking trails and plod on through mountain villages, doing our best to negotiate the rough and rocky trail underfoot and the yak traffic in our way. After ascending the long climb up to the mile 17 check point we are exhausted, but continue to overtake runners as we begin the Thamo loop and then return to Namche to cross the finish line together in 9hrs 43mins!

We are too tired to celebrate; with relief and satisfaction we dare contemplate our first beer for weeks and a proper bed!

If you answered YES to the **two** questions above then you will be liable for the new High Income Child Benefit Charge.

What does this mean?

You can still receive Child Benefit payments but if you're a higher-income family, you'll have to pay extra tax which will cancel out some, or all, of your payments.

Individual incomes are assessed not your combined household. Therefore if one partner earns over £50,000 and the other partner earns less (or even no income) you will be liable. However if both you and your partner have an income just below the £50,000 limit; you will not be affected. Where both partners earn over £50,000; whoever has the higher income will have to pay the extra tax.

What are your options if you are affected?

You can still continue to receive Child Benefit payments but you will need to declare the payments annually on a self assessment tax return (the first of which must be filed online with HMRC by 31 January 2014). It may in fact still be beneficial for you to continue your payments if you or your partner's income is between £50,000 and £60,000, as the tax charge will be less than the Child Benefit.

OR

You can choose to stop receiving the Child Benefit payments to avoid paying the additional tax and potentially completing a self assessment tax return. If you or your partner earn over £60,000, the tax charge will be the same as the Child Benefit payments anyway. You can always restart the payments if your circumstances change and only the person who is entitled to Child Benefit can stop the payments.

CAN YOU HELP?

1ST WILSHIRE REGIMENT DURING WORLD WAR I

After the success of their participation in the Nov 11th commemorations in Ypres in 2012, 10th Chippenham Air Scouts troop and Endeavour Explorer Scouts will be walking from Mons (Belgium) to Le Cateau (France) in August 2014 retracing the steps walked by the 1st Wiltshire Regiment exactly 100 years earlier. The scouts will also be visiting the area where Wilfred Owen fought his last battle in 1918. They will be joined on the 55km walk by scouts from Belgium, France and Germany.

Before they leave, the scouts are keen to research the stories of the men of the 1st Wiltshire (Duke of Edinburgh) regiment and to understand where they came from, what their lives were before the war and what they faced in Belgium and France on the first days of battle for the British Expeditionary Forces in 1914.

We have found a few historical documents based on the war diaries in our research to prepare the trip but most of it is rather vague and patchy. We have also looked at the records of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission and there are several members of the 1st Wiltshire Regiment buried around Le Cateau (from the 1914 and 1918 battles) but we cannot find much information about these men.



Many families have lived in the Parish for many generations and we would like your help. Do you have any records of that period? Do you know of family members who fought with the Regiment in France or Belgium during World War I? Do you have information that could help us put the events in a local context? If you do, please get in touch, we would be very grateful for your help.



25th November - Bremhill Village Hall.




There were 8 committee members and 4 members of the public present.

SMALL THOUGHTS OF A LARGE CLERGYMAN

As a doting father of a daughter (dads always spoil their daughters, I'm told) and along with every other father, I awaited with trepidation the day that the apple of my eye brought home her first boyfriend! Would he meet my exacting standards? Show respect to his elders, be well mannered, with good career prospects...? Or, horror of horrors, would her first love be none of these things, boorish, vain, inconsiderate and make loud jokes about her father's "fuddy-duddy" approach to life? And if this did turn out to be the case - could he be changed?

History tells us of such a man, a man called Francis Bernadone, and all of the latter comments applied to him. His one saving grace, to a prospective father-in-law at least, was the fact that he was incredibly rich! You could use all sorts of very different words to describe St Francis of Assisi, of course - gentle, humble, kind, fearless. What a man he was!
