

## Kelly's Directory 1875

WINTERBOURNE DANTSEY (or Dauntsey, or Middle Winterbourne), is a village and parish, situated in the Bourne Valley, in the Southern division of the county, Alderbury hundred, Salisbury county court district, Amesbury union, diocese and archdeaconry of Salisbury, and rural deanery of Amesbury, 4 miles from Salisbury north-east, 5 from Amesbury south-east, and 2 south-south-west from Porton railway station.

The church of the parish has been taken down; the inhabitants use the new church of Winterbourne Earls, built for the two parishes, which are united for ecclesiastical purposes.

Here is a chapel used by the Methodist New Connexion.

George Burtt Esq who is lord of the manor, Mrs King Wyndham, and C.E. Clark, Esq, are chief landowners.

The soil is chalk, subsoil same. The chief crops are wheat, barley and roots. The area is 1,143 acres; gross estimated rental £1,609; rateable value £1,339; in 1871 the population was 164.

Figsbury Ring (or Chlorus's Camp) is 1 mile south-east.
