



# Kellys Directory Extract 1867



## Barford St. Martin

BARFORD ST. MARTIN is a parish and village in the Southern division of the county, hundred of Cawden and Cadworth, Wilton union, Salisbury county court district, diocese and archdeaconry, and rural deanery of Chalke, 6 miles west-north-west from Salisbury, 3 west of Wilton, and 89 from London by South Western Railway. The church is an ancient building in mixed styles; it consists of a nave, chancel, north and south transepts, and square tower with 5 bells; the whole was completely restored in 1843. The register dates from 1653. The living is a rectory, value £577, with residence, in the gift of All Souls College, Oxford and held by the Rev. Charles Hinxman, M.A., of Balliol College, Oxford. There is a handsome National school, built at a cost of £1,645, of which the Committee of the Privy Council contributed £488, comprising mixed and Infant schools, with teachers' residence and ample playgrounds; there is also a chapel for Dissenters. The Earl of Pembroke is lord of the manor. The principal landowners are the Earl of Pembroke and A. P. E. Powell, Esq. The soils is principally chalk; subsoil chalk. The population in 1861 was 519; the area is 2,236 acres, principally arable and pasture land.

GROVELY WOOD, formerly extra-parochial, is now a parish, a mile and a half north-west, where a small church has lately been erected by the Earl of Pembroke. In the neighbourhood are some ancient entrenchments. The population in 1861 was 50.
