Compton Chamberlayne Men That Served Their Country & Returned Home



World War I

Thomas MOREY

Thomas Morey was born in Compton Chamberlayne, around November, 1864, to parents John & Sarah Morey.

The 1871 Census shows Thomas Morey as a 7 year old, living with his family, at Compton Street, Compton Chamberlayne, Wiltshire. His parents – John Morey (aged 38, agricultural labourer) & Sarah (aged 36) had 6 children at this time – Jesse (aged 14), George (aged 12), Edward (aged 10), Thomas (aged 7), William (aged 3) & Charles (aged 1 yr).

The 1881 Census records Thomas Morey as a 17 year old, agricultural labourer, living in the parish of Fovant, Wiltshire with his family. Thomas's father – John B Morey is recorded as being a 49 year old Engine driver (born Dorset) & Thomas' mother – Sarah is recorded as being aged 46 (born Dorset). Also included in the house were siblings – George (aged 22, born Dorset), Thomas (aged 17), William H (aged 14, born Dorset), Charles (aged 12, born Ireland), Elizabeth (aged 8, born Compton Chamberlayne), John (aged 5, born Norton-Bavant, Wiltshire) & Walter (aged 3, born Compton Chamberlayne).

Thomas Morey enlisted on 22nd March, 1883 with the Royal Artillery (Military Transfer), with a Service number of 37153. He enlisted at Devizes at the age of 19 years & 4 months. Thomas listed his occupation as Labourer & had previously served with the 3rd Battalion of Wiltshire Regiment.

His agreement was for Service for 12 years & Thomas Morey signed his Attestation Papers with an X (highly likely that he was unable to read & write).

Thomas Morey's Statement of Services form shows that he was ranked as a Driver from 22nd March, 1183 to 30th April, 1883 at Royal Artillery Depot, Southern Division. He was transferred to 2nd Brigade Royal Artillery from 1st May 1883 until 30 November, 1883 & continued as a Driver until 7th March 1886.

Thomas Morey's Military History sheet shows he served at home from 22nd March, 1883 until 17th December, 1883. He was in Egypt from 18th December, 1883 to 11 September, 1885.

Thomas Morey was promoted to the rank of Gunner on 8^{th} March, 1886 until 30 June, 1889. He was discharged 21^{st} March 1895 – 1^{st} Class Army Reserve.

Thomas again served at home from 12th September, 1885 until 21st March, 1895, a period of 9 years.

Thomas Morey received the Egyptian Medal & Clasp for his involvement in the Suakin in 1885.

Thomas Morey married Elizabeth Udall on 28th May, 1889 at Wesley Chapel, Warwick & their marriage was registered in the June quarter of 1889 in the district of Coventry, Warwickshire.

The 1891 Census records Thomas Morey as a 28 year old Cab Driver, living with his wife Elizabeth, aged 24 & 1 year old daughter Elizabeth S. The family of 3 are recorded as living at New Buildings, Lot 1 Coventry, Warwickshire.

The 1901 Census records Thomas Morey as a 36 year old Steam engine driver, living with his wife Elizabeth, aged 36 & their 5 children – Elizabeth (aged 11), William (aged 9), Kate (aged 5), Harriet (aged 3) & Thomas (aged 1). The family were recorded at Gosford St, Coventry, Warwickshire & all the children had been born at Coventry.

The 1911 Census records Thomas Morey as a 48 year old Scavenger/Labourer, living with his wife Elizabeth, aged 46 & their 6 children – Kate (aged 16), May (aged 14), Tommy (aged 11), Liddia (aged 9), Walter (aged 7) & Horace (aged 5). The census records that Thomas & Elizabeth had 9 children in total, with only 6 still living. The family was recorded at 7H 8C Cox St, Coventry, Warwickshire.

Thomas Morey enlisted in the Army on 20th October, 1915 at Coventry, aged 46. He was assigned to the Royal Engineers – Railway Troops Labour Section with a service number of 135818 & rank of sapper.

Thomas Morey was discharged from the Army on 16th May, 1916 as medically unfit for a previous fracture of his right leg/ankle.

A death was registered for a Thomas Morey, aged 68 in the December quarter of 1930, in the district of Coventry, Warwickshire.
