Monument Name	Monument Location	Notes
Bell Barrow	350m north of Haydon Farm	** At Risk 2011 – from Arable ploughing. Condition – Extensive significant problems.
Bell Barrow on Parsonage Down	1.30 Km south-east of Lord's Hill Farm	** At Risk 2011 – from Arable clipping Condition – Generally satisfactory but with significant localized problems.
Bell Barrow	130m south-west of North End Farm	Finds include medieval and later pottery "ironwork", a possible 12th century arrowhead, a 16th century spoonbit and 18th century grapeshot were found by R Colin Smith. The finds are in Salisbury Museum, accession number 12/67.
Bell Barrow	270m south-west of Norton Bavant House	Two bowl barrows excavated in 1786. Both found to contain primary cremations, one situated within a cinerary urn
Bell Barrow	300m south of Eastleigh Court	
Bell Barrow	500m south-eats of Eastleigh Court	Two bowl barrows excavated in 1786. Both found to contain primary cremations, one situated within a cinerary urn

Bell Barrow	On Littlecombe Down	** At Risk 2011 – from Arable ploughing. Condition – Extensive significant problems.
Long Barrow	250m east of Polebridge Farm	
Pair of Bowl Barrows	1050m north-north-west of Pertwood Wood	** At Risk 2011 – from Arable ploughing. Condition – Extensive significant problems.
Robin Hood's Bower Earthwork Enclosure	In Southleigh Wood	Said, in the 9th century recordings by both Bishop Asser and the Anglo Saxon Chronicle, to have been the camp site in May 878, for King Alfred with his commander Egwolf and their force of around three or four thousand men and horses, the night just prior to the great climactic battle in the war against the Vikings led by King Guthrum. This took place at Edington, 10 miles to the north. This famous victory by Alfred over the Vikings, who surrendered totally two weeks later, brought peace at last to Wessex and surrounding areas. Guthrum and the other Viking warlords were baptised into the Christian church by Alfred and the whole process of Viking integration into Saxon life began. <i>Peter Staveley, 8 August 2013</i>
Strip Lynchets	Immediately south-west of Woodcombe Cleve	A flight of 8 Medieval strip lynchets cut into a north west facing chalk scarp south of Sutton Veny and immediately south west of Woodcombe Cleve. Scheduled.
The Knoll – a Bell Barrow	300m west of Manor Farm	Probable round barrow sites, of Prehistoric or Roman date, seen as cropmarks.
