1850-1899

## 1855

Second Court, - before J. Ravenhill, Esq. Andrew Burton, stealing an axe at Wylye – 2 calendar months. **Devizes and Wiltshire Gazette, 5 July 1855** 

## 1878

Warminster Petty Sessions, Thursday. George Askell, Frank Smith, and Joseph Dought, of Wylye, and James Potter, Samuel Potter, Jams Nash, and Alfred Pretty, of Fisherton Delamere, were charged with breaking windows at Sherrington Flour Mill. They were fined 21s including costs. Western Gazette, 15 March 1878

## 1879

Joseph Doughty was fined 10s and costs for being drunk at Wylye. Western Gazette, 18 July 1879

#### 1885

James Hibberd, labourer, for a like offence [assault], on Wm. Brindle, of Wylye, on the 30th of March, was fined 15s including costs. Defendant was also fined 10s, including costs, for breaking a window at the Bell Inn, Wylye, on the same day. Western Gazette, 8 May 1885

#### 1889

Warminster Petty Sessions, Yesterday (Thursday) For assaulting an old man named Thomas Humphreys, at Wylye, on the 18th February, Frank Smith was fined £1 inclusive, or fourteen days. **Western** Gazette, 8 March 1889

The case against George Mitchell Young and Elizabeth Young, for selling bread at short weight, at Wylye, was adjourned until the 20th inst., for the attendance of Mr Powning, of Salisbury, the defendants' solicitor. **Western Gazette, 8 March 1889**
