Berwick St.John



Berwick St. John is a parish and village, in the Southern division of the county, Chalke hundred, Tisbury union, Hindon petty sessional division, Shaftesbury county court district, Salisbury diocese and archdeaconry, and Chalke rural deanery, 17½ miles south-west from Salisbury, 112½ from London, and 6½ east from Shaftesbury.

The church of St. John the Baptist is a cruciform structure, with a finely-ornamented low square tower of the date of Henry VII, springing from the intersection, and containing 5 bells; it contains monuments to the Grove family and other families of distinction; against the walls are two elliptic arches over ancient effigies, clad in mail, said to be those of Knights Templars. The register dates from 1556. The living is a rectory, yearly value £562, in the gift of New College, Oxford, and held by the Rev. Charles Arthur Griffith, M.A., of that college.

There is a National school, built on glebe land, in 1835, at the expense of the rector, and principally supported by him.

The Wesleyans and Baptists have each a chapel here.

There is a small sum left in charities by a former Lord Rivers, and Foot's charity of £3 3s 10d, and Grove's of £9 yearly, are distributed in money to the poor.

A strong earthwork or fortification known as Winklebury, or Vespasian's camp, is on a lofty ridge in this parish, and commands a view over Dorsetshire, the Downs, and a portion of Hampshire, as far as the Needles in the Isle of Wight. The rich forest of Cranhorne Chase occupies the foreground, and the un-interrupted view to be obtained over Wiltshire is finely and beautifully varied.

Lord Rivers is lord of the manor. Sir Thomas Fraser Grove, bart., is a large landowner here.

The soil is sandy and clay; subsoil, chalk and flint. The chief crops are wheat, oats, barley and pasture.

There are 3,000 acres of arable and down land; gross estimated rental, £3,752; rateable value, £3,419; the population in1871 was 444.
