



Marston Parish Meeting (25/11/2014)

Philip Salaman chaired the meeting attended by 18 parishioners.

Items discussed:-

Footpath repairs and maintenance - Dave Hansford is chasing the team at Wilts to assist with signage.

Flooding prevention - Landowners are requested to clear gulleys and ditches on their land.

Speed limit in the village - Speeding continues to be an issue and a METRO count will be requested.

Village Green - Wiltshire Wildlife Trust are to send information regarding good management and we will continue with the present contractor. It was agreed to cut a ride to the pond.

Ladies Group funds - The surplus funds will remain under the control of the Village Fund.

Next meeting: May 26th 2015

Marston Parish Council Meeting (25/11/2014)

Philip Salaman chaired the meeting attended by 10 parishioners.

Apologies for absence were received from Kathy Kavanagh and Richard Howard.

The following items were reported on:

Upgrading broadband services would cost £60,000. Richard Gamble reported that upgrading work is due to be started in early 2015.

SSE will be advised that trees need to be cut back in order that electricity cables are not affected. William Warden will undertake a survey of all trees on common land and quote for any remedial works required.

New stiles will be positioned before the end of December to comply with the PIGS application.

In order to relieve some of the cost of fencing the Village field the existing tenant is prepared to offer 5 years rent in advance.

The book share/borrow facility is now open in the telephone box. Thanks to all volunteers who helped with this project.

The following items were discussed:

Wiltshire Highways Authority has confirmed their ownership of the Norney Bridge "triangle" and have asked for all stones to be removed. MPC have asked for the bushes to be removed. In the spring work will be undertaken to clear shrubs and trees from the riverbank and a new seat will be provided.

There were no objections to 2 planning requests for trees to be removed.

The precept for 2015 will remain at £2,000.

MPC has been asked to provide an update on the number of unpaid carers in the village. Please inform a member of the council if this applies to you.

Date of the next meeting: 7.30pm 28th January 2015.

HAVE YOU EVER WONDERED WHAT IT MEANT?

There is one Christmas song that has always baffled me – what in the world do leaping lords, French hens, swimming swans and especially a partridge in a pear tree have to do with Christmas?

Today I found out. From 1558 until 1829, Roman Catholics in England were not permitted to practise their faith openly. Someone during that era wrote this as a catechism song for young Catholics. It has two levels of meaning: the surface meaning plus a hidden meaning known only to the members of their church. Each element in the song has a code word for a religious reality, which the children could remember.

The partridge in a pear tree was Jesus Christ.

The two turtledoves were the Old and New Testaments.

The three French hens stood for faith, hope and love.

The four calling birds were the four Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. The five golden rings recalled the Torah, or Law, the first five books of the Old Testament.

The six geese a-laying stood for the six days of creation.

Seven swans a-swimming represented the sevenfold gifts of the Holy Spirit: Prophecy, Serving, Teaching, Exhortation, Contribution, Leadership and Mercy. The eight maids a-milking were the eight Beatitudes.

Nine ladies dancing represented the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit: Love, Joy,

Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness and Self Control. The ten lords a-leaping were the Ten Commandments.

The eleven pipers piping stood for the eleven faithful disciples.

The twelve drummers drumming symbolized the twelve points of belief in the Apostles Creed.

So there is your history for today!



WORTON PARISH COUNCIL (WPC)

Road Safety

The road safety improvements have almost been completed. There is now a crossing point near the junction of Cedar Close and the areas for the school bus near Sandleaze will be completed shortly.

The Parish Council is continuing to explore ways to reduce speed within the boundary of the village and to consider ways to make our roads and pavements safer for all users. In addition, we have extended our efforts to cooperate with adjacent Parish Councils to examine ways that the C20 towards Seend can be made safer for all.

You may recall that as part of the process to improve road safety, we learnt that unless the police attend an accident (and they will only do so if there has been an injury or significant traffic disruption) the accident will not be recorded in the road safety statistics. Apparently it was the lack of RECORDED accidents at the western end of the village that contributed to the decision not to reduce the speed limit. Therefore, we ask all residents to record accidents; take the registration number, note the time, date and weather conditions, take a photo if possible and then give this data to any member of WPC.

PEAS (Parish Emergency Assistance Scheme) - A wonderful acronym for a scheme introduced by Wiltshire Council to assist Parish Councils to help their parishioners deal with emergency flood situations. To benefit from the assistance on offer (which comprises 1 ton bag of sand, 50 empty sandbags, 50 gel sacs, road flood warning signs and fluorescent 'flood warden' tabbards - now there's an incentive to get involved!), the Parish Council will need to develop a flood/ emergency plan. Once we are a member of the scheme, we will receive the emergency kit and be able to liaise directly with an Operational Duty room during emergency weather situations. We will be discussing this at <u>7.00 pm BEFORE our next Council meeting on 12th January</u> so if you are interested or could help in any way such as storing the emergency equipment, please do come along.
